

8.0 EFFECTS FOUND NOT TO BE SIGNIFICANT

8.1 OVERVIEW AND SUMMARY

Section 15128 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Statutes and Guidelines requires a brief statement of the reasons why various possible significant effects of a project have been determined not to be significant and, therefore, are not discussed in detail in the environmental impact report (EIR). The following provides a discussion regarding the effects of the proposed project that were found not to be significant.

8.2 EFFECTS FOUND NOT TO BE SIGNIFICANT

The discussion below includes criteria from Appendix G of the *State CEQA Guidelines* followed by a short analysis of the environmental effects.

8.2.1 Mineral Resources

Would the proposed project:

- a. Result in the loss of availability of a known mineral resource that would be of value to the region and the residents of the state?**

No mineral resources exist on the project site that would be considered of value to the region or state. Ventura County performed a study as part of its Mineral Reserve Management Program which did not identify any aggregate resources of statewide significance in the Camarillo areas.¹ The project site is identified by the County as a Mineral Resource Zone (MRZ) 1; these are areas where adequate information indicates that no significant mineral deposits are present.²

- b. Result in the loss of availability of a locally important mineral resource recovery site delineated on a local general plan, specific plan, or other land use plan?**

No mineral resources exist on the project site that would be considered of value to the region or state. Ventura County performed a study as part of its Mineral Reserve Management Program which did not identify any aggregate resources of statewide significance in the Camarillo areas.³ The project site is

identified by the County as a Mineral Resource Zone (MRZ) 1; these are areas where adequate information indicates that no significant mineral deposits are present.⁴
